The College of Diplomates Grows Up by Fred Goodman

The next decade will show, if the numbers prove correct a huge jump in prospective Board candidates. The new category produced tremendous results this past spring. One hundred sixty participants applied for the written exam during their year of graduation. One hundred fifty eight (99%) passed: a wonderful tribute to the American Board of Endodontics, and their goal of making it more convenient for the eligible candidates to take the exam closer to home. To quote Dr. William Schindler, in the Diplomate Newsletter last fall "I'm sure that many of you remember the day long examination.....held on a cold November day in Chicago. The format required one to take two or three days from your practicepay for an expensive hotel room.....take the exam, and then travel back to your home." Well now a prospective candidate may take the exam as a computer based test at Pearson Vue testing centers around the country. The next written examination will be held over a nine day period Monday through Friday May 29th -June 8th, 2007.

What does this new and obviously popular change mean for the College of Diplomates??? It certainly will increase the load on the mentoring committee, but Dr. Andre Mickel assures me not

to worry. The website will have to handle more info to post, Dr. Joe Dovgan is our computer "genius" and is up to the task. So you get the picture. It is a daunting task, but the college has grown up and is ready and able.

For those candidates submitting cases, portfolios are accepted for review twice a year and must be received in the central office on or before April 1st and October 1st.

For those eligible for the oral examination, they will be held in Philadelphia on April 23rd and 24th, 2007, or in Chicago on November 9th and 10th, 2007.

To all participants the college wishes you ----good luck!!!!!!!!!!!!!!

The College Board of Directors now needs, more than ever, to monitor its results with the candidates so it can evaluate the mentoring we do. It would be beneficial if the college could be proactive and make initial contact with the candidates rather than having to wait for the candidates to seek our services. Discussions took place in Hawaii this past spring with reference to having the applicants check off yes or no to having the college contact them. To this end, directors Sandy Madison and "Chuck" Cunningham have been asked to draw up a letter of request to the ABE.

Secretary's Report (Summer/Fall) by Harold E. Goodis

The business of the College of Diplomates was carried out since the last Secretary's report by monthly conference calls with the Directors and meetings held at the AAE in March and the COD summer conference in August. The focus of this review will be to report on the 2006 Grossman luncheon, address the results of the College's appeal for increased recognition and exposure from the AAE membership and report on the 2006 Summer Conference held at the Santa Ana Pueblo Hyatt Resort in New Mexico.

The Grossman Luncheon was very well attended. Our speaker, Dr. Charles Bertolami, Dean of the University of California School of Dentistry, delivered the keynote address. His topic entitled "Why our Ethics Curricula Don't Work: A Wink and a Blink" was very well received. As reported by the Secretary in a previous Pinnacle, various suggestions for the increased recognition and exposure from the AAE were discussed by the Board of Directors. The Directors requested a meeting with the Executive Board of the AAE and the Directors of the ABE. The Secretary is happy to report that both

meetings were concluded satisfactorily.

Our booth at the national meeting was adjacent to that of the ABE in the Oasis area of the exhibit hall. Inclusion of Director's names and photographs and the Mission Statement will be included in the 2007 AAE Directory. Photographs of the College Directors together with the new Diplomates should be included in the annual session's program. Ribbons designating College Directors and Officers will be added to the ID badges. A user friendly link between the AAE's and the College's web pages will be established. Identification of the candidates for Diplomate status will be forthcoming and added to the College's database in order to allow contact and presentations for mentoring by College members. This will aid in the successful completion of the certification process.

It was suggested that the ABE include the following on the ABE application form. "Permission is hereby granted to release my name to the College of Diplomates of the American Board of Endodontists for the sole purpose of receiving information regarding the College's activities".

A very successful Summer

Conference was held on the Santa Ana Pueblo in New Mexico. The Hyatt Resort was a beautiful structure that blended into the landscape in a very special way. Over 70 College members and their families were present.

Our two speakers presented a unique program that was very well received by the attendees. Dr. Markus Haapasalo, the Chair of Endodontics at the University of British Columbia, opened the meeting with a most informative presentation entitled "It's all about infections...almost". He has authored over 80 papers in the field of endodontic microbiology, disinfection and medications. Dr. Richard Schwartz, in private practice in San Antonio and a faculty member at UTHSCSA, has authored "Fundamentals of Operative Dentistry" and his presentation was entitled "Everything an endodontist needs to know about restorative dentistry, but is afraid to ask". He also included a most interesting talk on the role endodontists should take in placement of implants.

In sum, this has been a busy year for the Directors of the College of Diplomates. It is expected that the next year will be the same.

First University of Maryland Board Review Course Attracts Large Crowd by Lamar Hicks

The first ever "Endodontic Board Review and Scientific Update" course, sponsored by the University of Maryland, was held on September 15-17, 2006 at the Wyndham Baltimore Inner Harbor Hotel in Baltimore. Reflecting the broad interest in continuing education in the clinical and basic science areas of the endodontic specialty, 165 endodontists, endodontic residents and faculty members attended this intense 2 ½ day course. Continuing its longtime history of supporting educational events that promote board certification in endodontics, the College of Diplomates sponsored a 1 ½ hour Friday evening session on preparing for the examinations of the American Board of Endodontics.

This well attended board preparation session was presented by Dr. Gary Hartwell, the Chairman and Endodontic Program Director at the New Jersey Dental School and a former Director and President of the ABE. Immediately after

Dr. Hartwell's presentation, the College provided the 57 participants with a much appreciated ice cream social.

The 9 speakers for the course included 3 editors of major dental journals, Dr. Rex Holland (Archives of Oral Biology), Dr. Ken Hargreaves (Journal of Endodontics) and Dr. Michael Glick (Journal of the American Dental Association) plus Dr. Jeff Hutter (Boston University), Dr. Christine Sedgley (University of Michigan), Dr. Gordon Pringle (Temple University) and Dr. Philip Stashenko (Forsyth Institute). The course director was Dr. Lamar Hicks. The next edition of the "Endodontic Board Review and Scientific Update" is being scheduled for October 2007 in Baltimore.

Graduate Programs Update

University of Missouri-Kansas City, School of Dentistry Kansas City, Missouri

This 24-month certificate endodontic postgraduate program prepares a dentist for a career in clinical endodontics, research and/or teaching and prepares them to challenge the requirements for certification as a Diplomate by the American Board of Endodontics. There are two first-year and two second-year residents.

The postgraduate endodontic clinic is a true state-of-the-art facility made possible by the generous donations of Mrs. Virginia Stowers, Dr. Ben Johnson, and other benefactors. The clinic is fully equipped with the latest technology in endodontics. Residents receive GME stipends of approximately \$21,000 per year. Residents are also paid 33 percent of the net fees collected for clinical treatment they provide in the program. Applicants must be citizens of the United States or a foreign national having a visa permitting permanent residence in the United States. Applicants must also submit evidence of graduation from a school of dentistry accredited by the American Dental Association or the Canadian Dental Association.

Columbia University's Postdoctoral Endodontic Program is this year celebrating its 40th anniversary.

The duration of the certificate program is 24 months.

Five postdoctoral students are accepted each year. There is a possibility to include a third year for a master's degree for those who are interested in research.

There are 4 full-time faculty members within the Division of Endodontics. In addition there is a cadre of volunteer faculty teaching ½ to 1 day per week. The program has a new, state of the art clinic that is situated in close proximity to the specialty clinics of Prosthodontics, Periodontics, and Orthodontics making cooperation between clinicians easy.

Columbia University is a strong research university and the cooperation with other schools within the university is a clear benefit for postdoctoral students.

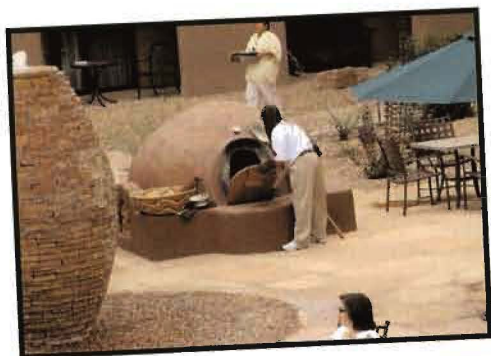
The program began in 1965. Six (6) students are selected each year for a two (2) year certificate program. Daniel Green is Chairman of the Department of Endodontics and Director of Postgraduate Endodontics. He is one of five full-time faculty. There is one half-time faculty and one 30% faculty. In addition there are 21 additional members of the faculty who are part-time and devote 1/2 day per week to the department.

Fifteen faculty are Diplomates of the American Board of Endodontics and ten more have completed the Part I examination and are progressing toward diplomate status.

The 2006 University of Michigan 19th Annual Review of the Biological and Clinical Aspects of Endodontology was held on March 16, 17, 18, 2006 and it was a great success.

The two and one half day board program presented a comprehensive study of the most recent endodontic research as well as a follow up of the classic endodontic literature review. The U of M Conference stressed the value of evidence base endodontics.

The course objective is to offer the most pertinent endodontic information that candidates for American Board certification will utilize for their Board preparation.

The College of Diplomates sponsored a soft drink/wine and hors d'oeuvre reception at the completion of the second lecture day and it was well attended.

During my introduction of Dr. Carl Newton, who was the visiting AAE/ABE Director, I shared the history of the COD and its mission to mentor and educate candidates for Board certification.

Dr. Newton followed with his, in depth, presentation of the Board guidelines, requirements and time lines. He detailed any changes in the Board process and the challenges that every candidate needed to know.

Dr. Newton, former COD Secretary and Director, acknowledged the COD efforts to increase the numbers of candidates taking the three stages of Board certification and to increase the percentages of candidates successfully passing the Boards. Dr. Newton is to be thanked for his leadership with the COD and now with his ABE service. He has been a great ambassador for the Specialty of Endodontics.

Report on the COD Summer Conference or "A Respite at the Santa Ana Pueblo" by Debra Meadows

This year's biannual College of Diplomates conference held at the Hyatt Tamaya Resort in New Mexico on August 2-4, was informative endodontically as well as culturally. The two speakers were Drs. Markus Haapasalo and Richard Schwartz. The conference was held in a unique setting this year. The resort is situated on 500 acres of Native American land with spectacular views of the majestic Sandia Mountains and the Rio Grande. It is the largest resort ever developed on Native American land and their ancient cultural heritage permeates the air. With such great speakers and such a rich setting, the mood was set for a wonderful time.

After checking into the resort on Wednesday, we met for the welcome reception and barbeque. We dined on Southwestern-style cuisine while listening to the music of "South by Southwest". As the sun began to set, we connected with old friends. We enjoyed the lovely out-of-doors until the moon rose over the Sandia Mountains. It was a great start for the conference.

Early Thursday morning, we met for breakfast and were ushered into class for a cultural welcome by the tribe that calls

the Santa Ana Pueblo home. A tribal flutist played a lovely welcoming song and the head of the tribal gaming council welcomed us with a Native American blessing. Jerry Westenhaver, the general manager of Tamaya resort gave us some background information on the resort and how it came to be situated on tribal lands.

Dr. Fred Goodman, president of the COD opened the meeting by welcoming us and introducing Dr. Harold Goodis, the program coordinator. AAE President, Dr. John Olmstead was in attendance and gave us some information on the state of the AAE. Then our first lecturer, Dr. Haapasalo began his talk titled, "It's all about Infections....almost".

Dr. Haapasalo started his discussion on resorptions and encouraged participation from the audience. 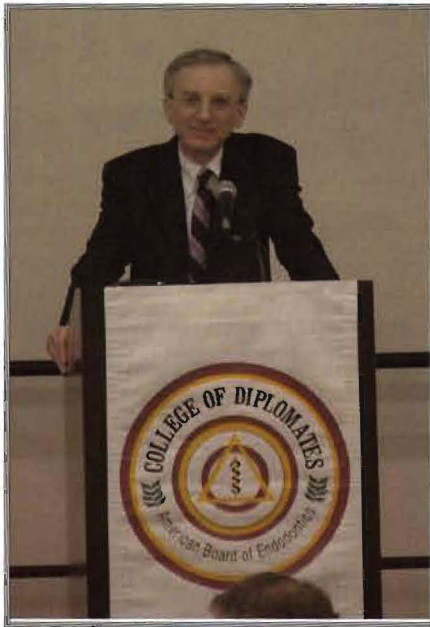
